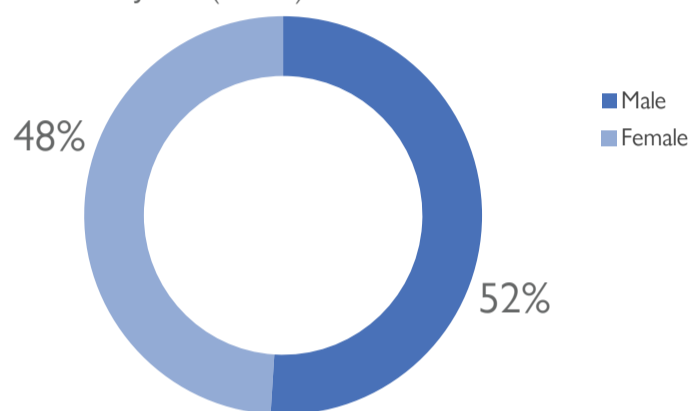
OVERVIEW

The lingering conflict in Nigeria's North East Zone has been the major cause of widespread population displacement. Over 2 million persons have been forced to leave their areas of residence in search of safety and security in neighbouring wards and LGAs.

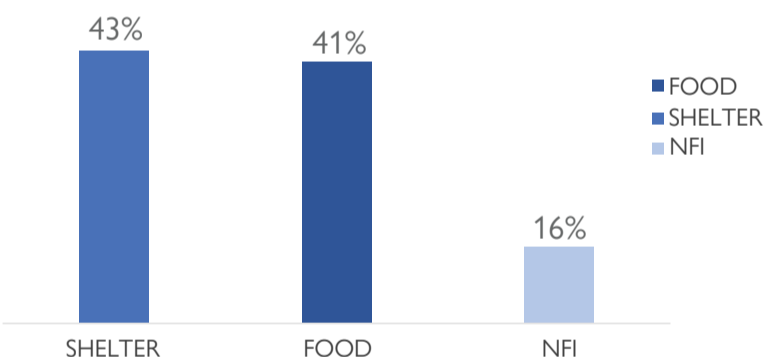
Since the beginning of March, repeated attacks by Non-State Armed Groups (NSAG) have been reported in Dikwa LGA. Following these attacks, numerous displacements have occurred and continue to occur until today. Flow monitoring assessments have been conducted by IOM DTM field staff with the purpose of informing the humanitarian community and government partners about forced population movements, and enabling targeted response. DTM enumerators were deployed in the transit point Dikwa Motor Park in the ward Dusuman in Jere LGA. IDPs passing through the transit point were asked about their intended destinations and most needed assistance. Since the beginning of May, it was noted that numerous households have started to return to their locations of origin. These return movements were also captured at Dikwa Motor Park in the ward Dusuman and are presented on the map and graphic below.

As a result of the attacks between 17 and 23 July 2021, a total of 1,097 individuals were displaced from Dikwa LGA towards the LGAs Jere, Konduga and Maiduguri Metropolitan Council. They arrived at Dikwa Motor Park from various camps and communities in Dikwa LGA. As presented on the map below, their intended destinations were locations in the LGAs Jere, Konduga and Maiduguri Metropolitan Council in Borno State. Since the first attack in Dikwa on 1 March 2021, a total of 27,884 IDPs have been recorded by DTM in Dikwa Motor Park. They were displaced from Dikwa LGA and en route to destinations in the LGAs Jere, Konduga and Maiduguri Metropolitan Council in Borno State. Additionally, since 1 May 2021, a total of 14,440 returnees have been recorded by DTM in the same transit point. They are returning from locations in the LGA Maiduguri Metropolitan Council towards Dikwa LGA.

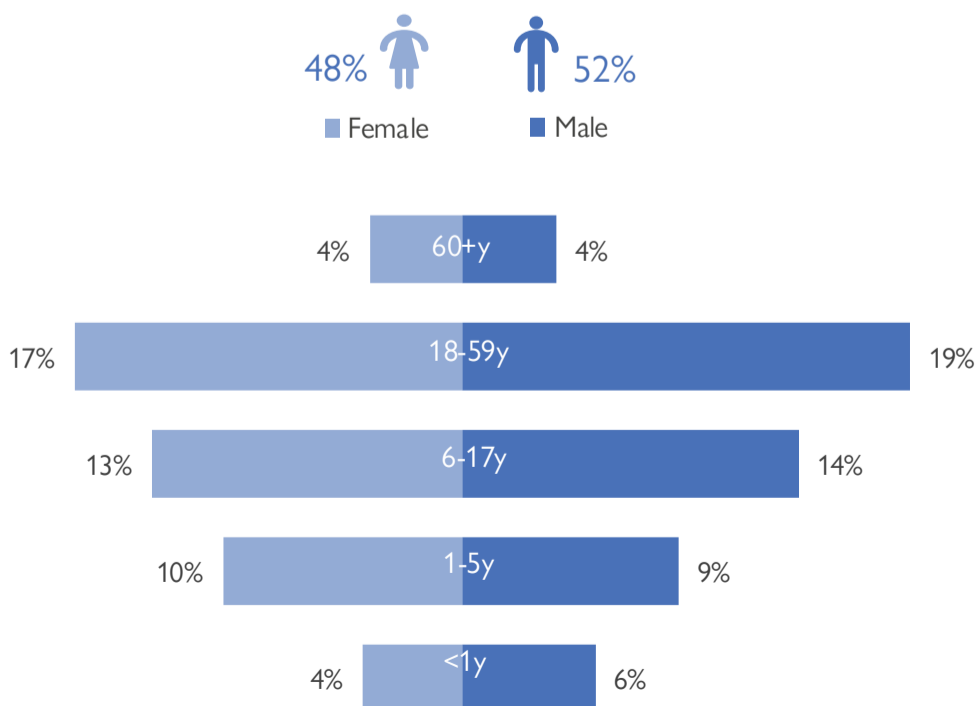
GENDER OF IDPs RECORDED BETWEEN 17 AND 23 JULY (FIG. 1)



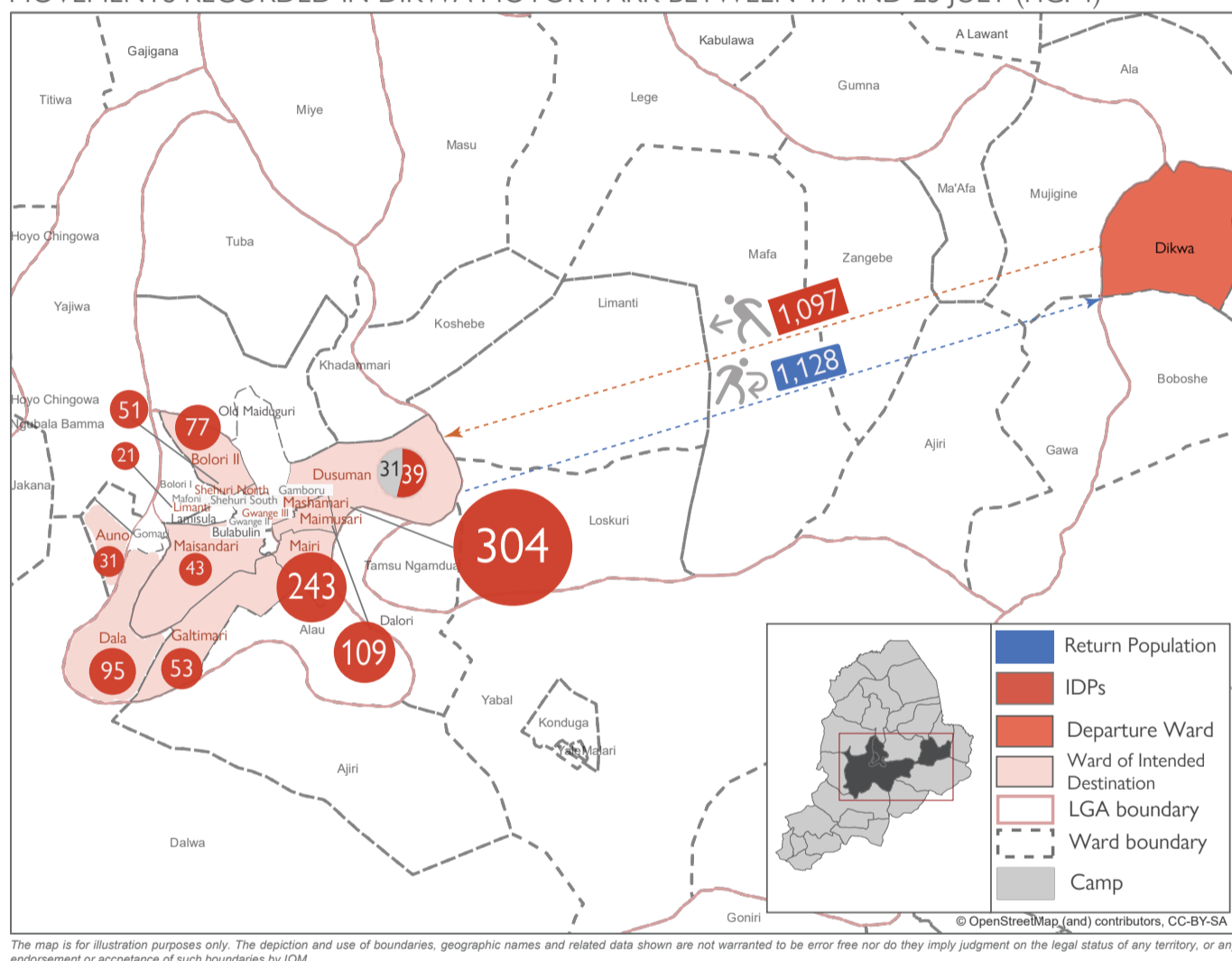
IDPs MOST NEEDED ASSISTANCE OF IDPs RECORDED BETWEEN 17 AND 23 JULY (FIG. 2)



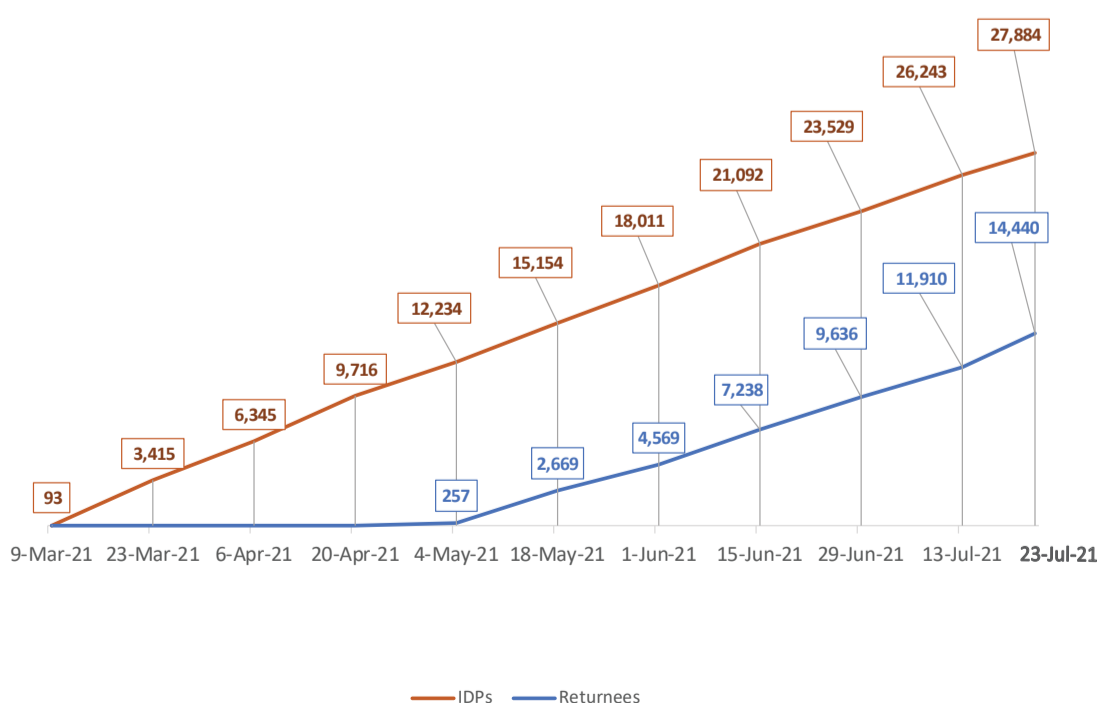
AGE CLASSIFICATION OF IDPs RECORDED BETWEEN 17 AND 23 JULY (FIG. 3)

SECTORIAL INFORMATION ON LOCATION OF ORIGIN - DIKWA



Care International distributed food in camps and host communities in the past week. IDPs in Masarmari, Fulatari, Sangaya and Klagaru Camps complained about the omission of beans from the food items distributed to them.



In the past week, IOM's NFI unit, with the support of Green Code, IOM CCCM Community Outreach Volunteers (COV) and SEMA distributed non-food items to the IDPs in Dikwa.



It has been observed that most shelters are completely destroyed by windstorms, rainfall and fire outbreaks while others are partially damaged because of termites and worn-out tarpaulins. During the past week, IOM Shelter, in collaboration with Sheriff Aid Foundation, distributed shelter kits across camps in Dikwa to 400 households.



There are two functioning health facilities in Dikwa, the General Hospital and the clinic, both are operated by the government. However, the facilities and medication do not suffice to meet the needs of the IDPs and host community.



IOM WASH volunteers continued COVID-19 sensitization and hygiene promotion campaigns in various camps. In the past week, the hygiene promotion included a cholera prevention campaign in case an outbreak should occur. On a weekly basis, the environmental and sanitation situation is assessed by the IOM WASH volunteers.



There were no security issues reported in the past week.
