


DISPLACEMENT TRACKING MATRIX - Nigeria EMERGENCY TRACKING TOOL (ETT)

MOVEMENT NUMBERS AND TYPES Arrivals: 2,226 individuals Departures: 559 individuals




The DTM Emergency Tool (ETT) is deployed to track and to collect information on large and sudden population movements, provide frequent updates on the scale of displacement and quantify the affected population when needed. As a sub-component of the Mobility Tracking methodology in Nigeria. ETT utilises direct observation and a broad network of key informants to capture best estimates of the affected population per location, enabling targeted humanitarian response planning.


Between 28 February and 06 March 2022, a total of 2,785 movements were recorded in Adamawa and Borno States. The recorded movements consisted of 2,226 arrivals and 559 departures. Arrivals were recorded at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Biu, Gwoza, Hawul, Monguno and Ngala Local Government Areas (LGAs) of the most conflict-affected Borno State and in Fufore, Girei, Gombi, Hong, Lamurde, Maiha, Michika, Mubi South, Numan, Song, Yola North and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa State.

Departures were recorded in Askira/Uba LGA of Borno State and in Fufore, Gombi, Hong, Lamurde, Maiha, Michika, Mubi South, Numan, Song, Yola North and Yola South LGAs of Adamawa State.

ETT assessments identified the following movement triggers: voluntary relocation (1,361 individuals or 49%), military operations (429 individuals or 16%), conflicts/attacks (368 individuals or 13%), improved security (332 individuals or 12%), poor living conditions (201 individuals or 7%), fear of attack (89 individuals or 3%) and camp closures/government relocation schemes (5 individuals or <1%).

SUMMARY OF MAJOR MOVEMENTS

Affected population

Bama: Eight hundred and eighty-four (884) arrivals were recorded in Bama LGA of Borno State. The arrivals included 824 individuals from within Bama LGA and 60 individuals from the Marwa region in Cameroon. Sixty-four per cent (64%) of the movements were due to voluntary relocation and 36 per cent were a result of military operations.

Country of departure of arriving population

Biu: Two hundred and fifty-four (254) arrivals were recorded in Biu LGA of Borno State. All arrivals recorded were from within Biu LGA. All movements recorded were due to conflicts/attacks.

Fufore: Twenty-one (21) arrivals and 201 departures were recorded in Fufore LGA of Borno State. All arrivals recorded were from Song LGA in Adamawa State. The departures included 176 individuals to Bama LGA in Borno State, 18 individuals to Fufore LGA and seven (7) individuals to Yola South LGA in Borno State. Eighty-nine per cent (89%) of the movements were a result of voluntary relocation and 11 per cent were due to poor living conditions.

Gwoza: Two hundred and nineteen (219) arrivals were recorded in Gwoza LGA of Borno State. The arrivals included 202 individuals from within Gwoza LGA and 17 individuals from Bama LGA in Borno State. Fifty per cent (50%) of the movements were a result of military operations and 50 per cent were due to poor living conditions.

NEW ARRIVAL MALNUTRITION SCREENING SUMMARY (CHILDREN 6 - 59 MONTHS)

Between 28 February and 06 March 2022, an exhaustive nutrition screening using Mid-Upper Arm Circumference (MUAC) and oedema for acute malnutrition was conducted by sector partners for 292 children of 6-59 months. Of the 292 children screened, the MUAC reading indicated that 17 children were recorded in the red category, 46 children in the yellow category and 229 children in the green category. No case of oedema was reported in the four LGAs assessed.

The results also included 10 children who arrived from neighbouring countries (7 in Bama LGA and 3 in Monguno LGA). Of all the 10 children measured, none was recorded in the red category, one was in the yellow category, and 9 were in the green category. All children found with acute malnutrition have been admitted for treatment. Please note, the data presented are not surveillance results and should be interpreted with caution.
