

Displacement Tracking Matrix | DTM Sudan **Reifi Aroma, Kassala UPDATE I:** 21 SEPTEMBER 2021

EMERGENCY EVENT TRACKING Data collection: 18 September 2021

The DTM Emergency Event Tracking (EET) is deployed to track sudden displacement and population movements, provide more frequent updates on the scale of displacement, and quantify the affected population when needed. As a subcomponent of the new Mobility Tracking methodology in Sudan (Round Two), and activated on a need basis, EET utilises a broad network of key informants to capture best estimates of the affected population presence per location – a useful tool for humanitarian response planning and design.


Event Overview



DTM teams activated EET to monitor the displacement of individuals affected by heavy rains and flooding in Reifi Aroma locality, Kassala state on 10 September 2021. The first EET update estimates a total number of 1,924 individuals (400 households) were displaced from Aroma North (61%) and Albaraka Makali (39%) in Reifi Aroma locality, Kassala. All affected households have had their houses completely destroyed. The displaced populations are currently seeking shelter on nearby higher ground, roughly 10km away from the original sites of their displacement.


Field teams indicate that there are no reported deaths, and three individuals are reported to be injured. Field teams also indicate that four individuals report lost goods, cattle, and/or livestock. All affected individuals are Sudanese nationals. DTM teams identified at least 513 cases of additional vulnerabilities in need of assistance and support. Based on a ranking scale, the three priority needs across the caseload are Food, Emergency Shelter, and Non-Food Items.






🌾 Return Intention

Data collected through the return intention indicator suggests that 1,189 IDPs (61%) intend to remain in the same place, and 735 IDPs (39%) intend to return to their location of origin upon improvement of the security situation.
