
Context: The crisis currently affecting the Lake Chad Basin states results from a complex combination of factors, including conflict with Non-State Armed Groups, extreme poverty, underdevelopment and a changing climate, which together have triggered significant displacement of populations. As of 22 December 2022, Cameroon, Chad, Niger and Nigeria were hosting an estimated 5,752,539 affected individuals made up of Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs), Refugees (both in- and out-ofcamp) and Returnees (Former IDPs and Returnees from abroad). 77 per cent of the affected population (representing 4,438,320 individuals) were located in Nigeria, while 11 per cent resided in Cameroon (651,310) individuals), 5 per cent in Chad (289,954 individuals) and 6 per cent in Niger (372,955 individuals).
