

**ETT Report: No. 74 | 3 – 9 July 2018**

**Movements**

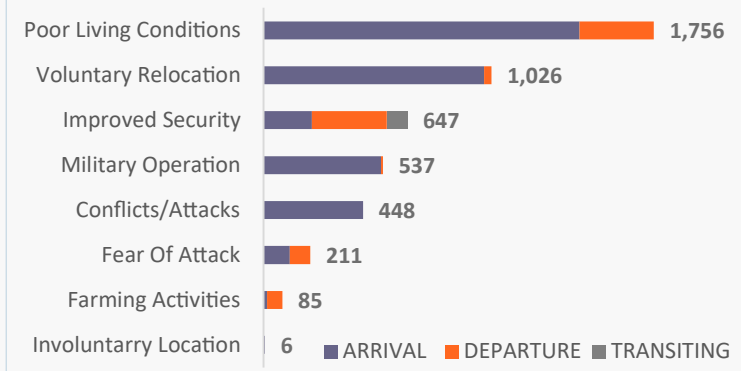


Within the period of 3 – 9 July 2018, a total of 4,716 movements were recorded, including 3,749 arrivals, 874 departures and 93 transit movements at locations in Askira/Uba, Bama, Biu, Chibok, Damboa, Demsa, Dikwa, Fufore, Girei, Gombi, Guzamala, Gwoza, Hawul, Hong, Jere,

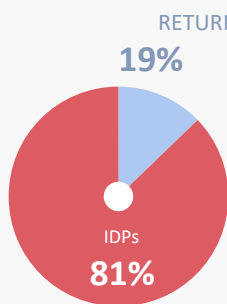
Kaga, Kala/Balge, Konduga, Kukawa, Madagali, Mafa, Magumeri, Maiduguri, Maiha, Michika, Mobbar, Monguno, Mubi-North, Mubi-South, Ngala, Nganzai, Numan, Yola-North and Yola-South Local Government Areas (LGAs) of Adamawa and Borno States.

Assessments identified the following main triggers of movements: poor living conditions (37%), voluntary relocation (22%), improved security (14%), military operations (11%), ongoing conflict (10%), fear of attacks (4%), and IDPs scouting for farmlands/farming activities (2%).

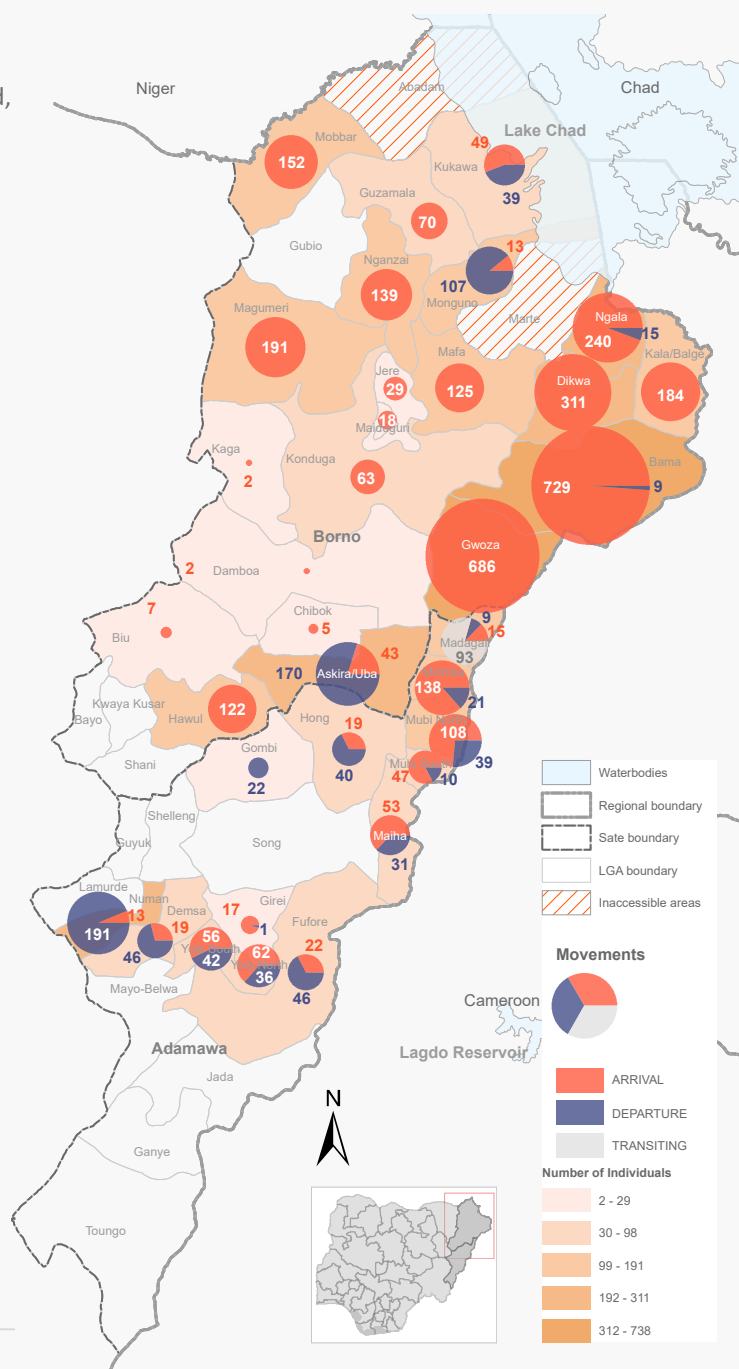
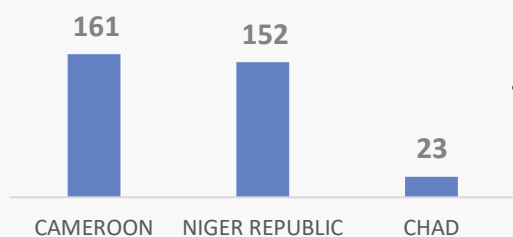
**Number of individuals by movement triggers**

**Summary of major movements**

**Bama:** 729 arrivals and 9 departures were recorded in Bama LGA of Borno State. These include 499 arrivals at GSSSS Camp from Soye/Abbaram wards of Bama, 230 arrivals at Banki Camp from Kumshe/Bale Galtimari wards of Bama, and 9 individuals who left GSSSS Camp for Michika LGA of Adamawa State. The main movement triggers include poor living conditions and voluntary relocation.

**Gwoza:** 686 arrivals were recorded in Gwoza LGA of Borno State. These include 281 arrivals at the Transit Camp in Pulka from surrounding wards in Gwoza and 405 arrivals at Bulabulin/Wakane ward of Gwoza LGA from Jere LGA (162 individuals) and Adamawa State (243 individuals). The main movement triggers include poor living conditions and voluntary relocation.

**Dikwa:** 311 arrivals were recorded at FOB Screening Centre in Dikwa LGA of Borno State. These include 218 arrivals from Gulumba ward of Bama LGA and 93 arrivals from Afuye ward of Dikwa. These movements were triggered by military operations in areas of Bama and Dikwa LGAs.

**Ngala:** 240 arrivals and 15 departures were recorded at Ngala LGA of Borno State. These include 36 who arrived at Arabic Camp from Cameroon, 42 arrivals at Arabic Camp from Ndufu ward of Ngala, 133 arrivals at Arabic Camp from Dikwa LGA, 29 arrivals at Gamboru ward of Ngala from Chad and 15 individuals who left Arabic Camp for Marte LGA. The main movement triggers include poor living conditions, voluntary relocation and military operations.

IOM's Emergency Tracking Tool (ETT) is deployed in Nigeria's northeastern states. Only Local Government Areas (LGAs) in which the IDP population changed since the latest DTM round of assessments are represented in this report. The data has been collected by DTM staff deployed at the locations listed and cross-checked with the partners present on the ground.
